## TIPRO TESTIFIES AT LATEST EPA AIR EMISSIONS MEETING

TIPRO's Senior Vice President Rich Varela provided testimony at the latest EPA meeting on Air Emissions on August 2, 2010 in Arlington, Texas. The message he delivered on behalf of producers and royalty owners outlined industry concerns on EPA's plans to revamp rules associated with air emissions from exploration and production operations. Highlights of the testimony include:

“TIPRO understands that regulation is important in protecting public health and the environment. Our members spend billions of dollars annually to protect our natural resources. We are not opposed to regulation. What we are opposed to is any regulation that is not based on factual information or scientifically proven data. Pursuit of accurate data should be paramount to implementing new regulations. Based on information published by the Texas Department of State Health Services and the Texas Department of Environmental Quality, we believe that accusations that oil and gas activity is having a significant adverse effect on air quality are unfounded. However, we agree that monitoring needs to be conducted to assure that the air is always protected.

Recently, EPA Region 6 requested that industry collaborate to develop a multi-state, county-by-county emissions inventory of oil and gas facilities. Oil and gas trade associations from Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Arkansas, in a letter to Doctor Armendariz, agreed to a coordinated approach to develop such an inventory. I would like to briefly highlight a few key points of that letter.

First, as you are well aware, the air quality in an area is affected by multiple sources. Therefore, any emission inventory that is developed should include all sources in a geographic area rather than focusing entirely on one industry segment such as oil and gas.

Second, we believe the best vehicle for providing emissions inventory data is for each state association to work through their respective state regulatory agencies and under the existing framework of the State Implementation Plan (SIP). State agencies have a defined role in the SIP process and thus are the appropriate party to coordinate this effort. In our view, the state agencies are in the best position to determine how to coordinate and work together to provide the quality and consistency of data that the EPA seeks.

Third, due to the cost, effort, and time associated with a state-wide inventory of oil and gas sources, we suggest that the most cost-effective and efficient way to proceed would be to perform an inventory of oil and gas emissions in the non-attainment areas or areas that are expected to be designated non-attainment under the 2010 ozone standard.

Last, we have requested that several parameters be adhered to in the development of an emissions inventory, including:

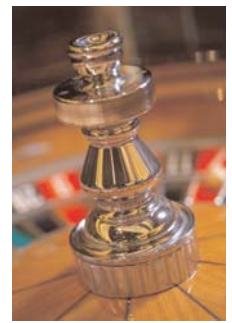
- The basic reporting unit is a "stationary source" as currently defined under the Clean Air Act and its implementing regulations.
- Establish a report year that is reasonably close in time to avoid a situation where records no longer exist, as there has been no regulatory requirement to keep such data.
- Data already submitted in a state emission inventory may be resubmitted as previously calculated as part of the new emission inventory.
- Allow generally-accepted modeling software and/or emission factors to calculate fugitive emissions.
- Emission inventory information for individual stationary sources should be aggregated and compiled by EPA, the state, and/or their contractors as needed.

There is no reason that the industry, the regulatory agencies, and the affected communities cannot work together harmoniously to preserve healthy air quality for citizens and at the same time encourage development of plentiful supplies of clean, abundant, and affordable American energy to power our nation's economy with jobs and reduce our reliance on foreign sources. While reasonable regulation is welcome, unnecessary regulatory burden would only serve to increase the cost of energy and hinder the exploration and development efforts of the industry to develop new reserves.”

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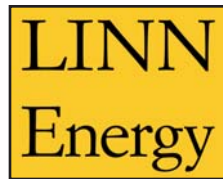


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
