PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

TIPRO Members,

Last week, TIPRO enjoyed the opportunity to travel to East Texas to meet with members of our association, as well as visit with state Representative Chris Paddie (R-Marshall), chairman of the House Energy Resources Committee, and Representative Cody Harris (R-Palestine), who also sits on this legislative committee with Chairman Paddie. Both of these lawmakers were allies of TIPRO this past legislative session, helping to move meaningful policies that benefit Texas independents and royalty owners. As some of you may recall, Chairman Paddie backed a priority bill - amongst other initiatives - for TIPRO last session, House Bill 1558/Senate Bill 533, that grants a five year severance tax exemption for wells that have been returned to active status after two years or more of inactivity. Representative Harris also authored legislation repealing certain registration and licensure requirements for manufacturers of compressed liquid gas (CNG) cylinders or liquid natural gas (LNG) containers, a measure TIPRO supported.

With the legislature's interim session now picking up steam, lawmakers are gearing up to tackle a new slate of issues ahead of Texas' 2021 Legislative Session. As such, by traveling to Chairman Paddie and Representative Harris' districts, TIPRO was glad to spend time with both of these officials to discuss priorities facing the Texas oil and natural gas industry, including interim charges that have been assigned to the House Energy Resources Committee. A balanced approach to critical infrastructure legislation, water reuse and recycling, and workforce development are a few areas of focus for TIPRO during the interim. Transportation infrastructure funding in energy producing areas of the state also continues to be a top priority. Quality infrastructure benefits local communities and ensures that product can get to market in the most efficient way, promoting a healthy and vibrant economy. While we had success in securing funding last session, we continue to pursue a long-term solution to our infrastructure funding needs.

Amid slowing business activity for the state's energy sector and reported declines to capital spending by oil and gas firms, TIPRO has used our recent regional meetings in Houston, San Antonio, Midland, Abilene, Marshall, and Palestine to engage our members and understand their perspective on market conditions and desired areas of focus for TIPRO from a legislative and regulatory perspective.

TIPRO is proud to offer the most active programmatic schedule in the state for members to network, learn and engage in our advocacy efforts. Our regional meetings and district forums will continue to allow our association to connect directly with our membership and offer a unique venue to discuss challenges and opportunities facing Texas producers and royalty owners today. I also look forward to connecting with hundreds of additional individuals tied to our industry through various speaking engagements this year, including the NARO-Texas Annual Convention in July. In the meantime, I hope you will consider joining us for TIPRO's next district policy forum on March 3rd in Corpus Christi with State Representative Todd Hunter, along with our upcoming Leaders in Industry Luncheon in Houston scheduled for Wednesday, February 12th and TIPRO's 74th Annual Convention on March 23-24 in Dallas.

TIPRO also continues to communicate with state elected officials in other ways during the interim. As an example, this week TIPRO delivered Hart Energy's special Permian Basin publication, as referenced in our previous newsletter, to 150 state elected officials in Texas, with additional outreach scheduled in the coming weeks. We also included information about TIPRO and material from our recent report, "A Decade of the Permian Basin." In the coming weeks, our organization will be releasing additional research-oriented reports highlighting economic trends and policy priorities for the Texas oil and natural gas industry. 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TEXAS RAILROAD COMMISSION SETS RECORD FOR PROCESSING DRILLING PERMITS IN TWO DAYS

Standard drilling permits in Texas now are being processed by the Railroad Commission in just two days, a new record for the agency responsible for managing the state's oil and gas development. The commission announced in January the administrative accomplishment, which is helping to support drilling operations in Texas, the nation's top producing state of oil and natural gas.

Obtaining a drilling permit or Form W-1 from the commission is one of the first steps oil and gas operators must take along with filing an Organization Report or P-5 and posting necessary bonds, explains the commission. This permit, once approved, allows drilling for a specific well for a duration of two years.

The agency's executive director, Wei Wang, credited increased use of online forms along with other technological advancements for allowing commission staff to hit this latest performance target and be able to review drilling permit applications with greater speed. "The Railroad Commission's technological solutions enables operators to quickly apply for and receive drilling permits," said Director Wang. "Nearly 99 percent of operators apply for drilling permits online. This allows our staff to thoroughly and quickly review each application to ensure operators meet all drilling permit requirements," he explained.

During Calendar Year 2019, the commission reports a total of 11,654 new drilling permits were processed, helping to foster the expansion of energy development throughout Texas.

"The Railroad Commission's efficient, timely permit review processes are essential to the continued development of the state's energy resources and ultimately support Texas' economic prosperity," added Wang.

RAILROAD COMMISSION ANNOUNCES NEW OIL & GAS FIELD OFFICE OPENING IN LUBBOCK

The Railroad Commission of Texas is expanding to help serve the regulatory community in the northern section of the Permian Basin. The agency announced this week it will open a new oil and gas field office based in Lubbock to assist with regulatory oversight of energy development in this region of the state, which has experienced surging drilling activity in recent years. "The new Lubbock office will enhance our regulatory capability in the region. It is a key strategic decision to address both operational and recruiting challenges we have experienced in our Western regional offices in recent years," said Wei Wang, executive director of the Railroad Commission. "The opening of our Lubbock office enables Railroad Commission staff to keep pace with the energy industry's growth in West Texas and the Permian Basin, and ultimately to ensure Texas oil and gas is produced safely and in compliance with our rules."

The Lubbock office will handle oversight of District 8A of the commission's existing statewide oil and gas districts, serving the following Texas counties: Bailey, Borden, Cochran, Cottle, Crosby, Dawson, Dickens, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Kent, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Scurry, Terry and Yoakum. This area was previously served by the Abilene Oil & Gas District office, notes the commission.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NAMES NEW APPOINTMENTS FOR SUNSET ADVISORY COMMISSION

Texas Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick announced this week four new appointments to the state's Sunset Advisory Commission, which oversees the review of state agencies and departments to streamline and improve the government. Senators Pat Fallon (R-Prosper), Eddie Lucio (D-Brownsville) and Angela Paxton (R-McKinney), have been asked to serve on the panel, as well as Ralph Duggins of Fort Worth, who is the new the public member appointee.

"The job of the Sunset Advisory Commission is to make sure Texas government remains lean, effective and efficient," commented Lieutenant Governor Patrick. "I am confident these appointees will ensure that our state agencies employ conservative principles in both planning and execution and that they remain accountable to the people of Texas."

As mentioned in the January 9th *TIPRO Target* newsletter, Speaker of the House Dennis Bonnen already has selected members from the House chamber to serve on the Sunset Advisory Committee for the coming legislative cycle. Representative John Cyrier (R-Lockhart) has been appointed as chairman of the commission.

TIPRO MEETS WITH TCEQ COMMISSIONER EMILY LINDLEY TO DISCUSS PRIORITIES

In mid-January, TIPRO President Ed Longanecker and Government Affairs Director Ryan Paylor met with Emily Lindley, environmental regulator and commissioner of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ), at the TIPRO office in Austin. During the meeting, Commissioner Lindley discussed with TIPRO leading issues the agency is actively working to address which involve oil and gas stakeholders, including an effort underway by the TCEQ to enhance voluntary data collection from operators, particularly those active in the Permian Basin region. Commissioner Lindley also noted to TIPRO how the commission hopes to reinforce permitting requirements managed by the TCEQ that enable producers to remain in compliance with state laws. TIPRO will work together with the TCEQ to share additional materials and information with members regarding this matter. TRUMP ADMINISTRATION FINALIZES NEW FEDERAL DEFINITION OF WATERS OF THE U.S.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and U.S. Department of the Army on Thursday, January 23rd unveiled the federal government's new finalized definition of 'waters of the United States' (known as WOTUS), clarifying federal regulatory authority and jurisdiction over water sources under the Clean Water Act. The new WOTUS definition, outlined under the new "Navigable Waters Protection Rule," replaces the federal government's interpretation of federally-regulated water sources from a 2015 rule which was set by the Obama Administration. This former definition had been heavily scrutinized since its implementation and was fought extensively through legal action pursued in the courts over the past five years. The state of Texas, in fact, led a coalition of 20 states fighting against the EPA's 2015 WOTUS regulation, claiming the Obama-era water rule had been a blatant power grab exceeding statutory authority set by Congress which directly infringed on state rights to regulate their own natural resources. Because of litigation, the 2015 Clean Water Rule (2015 Rule) has been in effect in 22 states, the District of Columbia and the U.S. territories, while previous regulations, issued in the 1980s, have been effective in the remaining 28 states.

Under the Trump Administration, the agencies have been working to finalize a revised WOTUS definition for more than a year, having proposed a new WOTUS rule in December of 2018 that offers clarity, predictability and consistency so public can understand where the Clean Water Act applies—and where it does not. Over the last year, the EPA and Department of Army have collected public input from stakeholders concerning the U.S. government's new WOTUS definition narrowing the scope of federal management of water resources. The Trump Administration notes that pre-proposal engagement for this rule generated more than 6,000 recommendations and approximately 620,000 comments were received on the proposal. Through public hearings, webinars, public comments and other consultations involving states, local officials, stakeholders and tribes, the EPA and Army have formulated a new water rule that strikes an appropriate regulatory balance protecting the nation's water sources while at the same time respecting private property rights and state authority over land and water use.

For the first time, the federal government is streamlining the WOTUS definition so that it includes four simple categories of jurisdictional waters, provides clear exclusions for many water features that traditionally have not been regulated, and defines terms in the regulatory text that have never been defined before. This final action also details what waters are not subject to federal control, including features that only contain water in direct response to rainfall; groundwater; many ditches, including most farm and roadside ditches; prior converted cropland; farm and stock watering ponds; and waste treatment systems. The rulemaking fulfills requirements provided under Executive Order 13788 issued by President Trump in 2017, and reflects legal precedent set by key Supreme Court cases as well as robust public outreach and engagement.

TIPRO President Ed Longanecker applauded Thursday's announcement from the Trump Administration, calling the new water rule necessary to providing clarity to regulated entities and America's energy producers. "The U.S. oil and gas industry has maintained a significant interest in the scope of federal jurisdiction under the Clean Water Act. All segments of the oil and natural gas industry are subject to extensive water permitting and regulatory requirements at both the state and federal levels for activities such as drilling and producing from oil and natural gas wells, refining crude oil, and transporting crude oil or refined product," said Longanecker. "The 2015 WOTUS regulation was an effort by the Obama Administration to expand the federal government's authority over land and water use across the nation, resulting in the need to acquire significantly more government permits and fulfill bureaucratic regulatory requirements. Protecting water resources is very important to independent producers, but the overly-broad power grab under the previous administration would have had a very negative impact on domestic oil and gas producers. We applaud the Trump Administration and EPA for their work on this important issue, and taking action to rectify concerns pertaining to the WOTUS rule."

Though EPA Administrator Andrew Wheeler, along with Mr. R.D. James, the assistant secretary of the Army for Civil Works, signed the final rule into effect on January 23, the EPA is waiting for the rule to be formally published in the Federal Register. The final rule will then become effective 60 days after publication in the Federal Register.

TPWD ADOPTS AMENDMENTS TO RULES FOR THREATENED AND ENDANGERED SPECIES

On Thursday, January 23, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) approved the adoption of amendments to the Threatened and Endangered Species List Rules and Amendments to the Prohibited Species for Commercial Activity List Rules. At a hearing convened Thursday by the TPWD, the commission reiterated that amendments to listed species do not result in any land use restrictions or economic impacts for industry. Previously, during a department meeting held last August, the TPWD approved publishing for formal comment revisions to Chapter 65, Rule 175 and Rule 176 of the Texas Administrative Code (Threatened and Endangered Nongame Species) in the Texas Register. The rulemaking was proposed with the intent to amend state threatened and endangered species lists and rules. The proposal appeared in the Texas Register on September 20. The proposed rule changes were as follows: under Sec. 65.175 (Threatened Species), the list of threatened species has been changed to remove 13 species (see list in proposed rule) and add 44 species to the list of threatened species. Under Sec. 65.176 (Endangered Species), the list of endangered species has been changed to remove three species and add nine species to the list of endangered species. The amendments also clarify that a species automatically receives state protection as an endangered species under state law in Texas if it is indigenous to Texas and listed by the federal government as endangered.

TIPRO will continue to monitor developments relating to this issue on behalf of the association's membership.

ENERGY COMPANIES SHINE A SPOTLIGHT ON HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN THE OIL & GAS INDUSTRY

More than 45 Houston-based energy companies, leveraging their global reach and scale, have formed a coalition named the Oil & Gas Trafficking Awareness Group (OGTAG) to shine a light on the crime of human trafficking, an issue surging in Houston and around the world. As part of National Human Trafficking Awareness Month, OGTA launched the *Energy Empowers Freedom Tour* to raise awareness of human trafficking in the oil & gas industry.

During this week-long event, taking place January 6-10, energy companies including Chevron, Shell, Marathon Oil, Weatherford, and NOV hosted educational events for employees and organized a tour of the Freedom Driver's Project throughout Houston with stops at the Port, Energy Corridor, Downtown, and the Galleria area. The Freedom Driver's Project is a mobile exhibit courtesy of Truckers Against Trafficking designed to educate individuals about the realities of human trafficking and how different industries, including oil & gas, are working to combat it.

EIA FORECASTS OIL PRICES TO AVERAGE \$65 PER BARREL IN 2020, HIT \$68/B IN 2021

In its latest energy outlook released in mid-January, the U.S. Energy Information Administration (EIA) forecasts Brent crude oil spot prices will average \$65 per barrel (b) in 2020, and rise to an average \$68/b next year, up slightly from the average of \$64/b maintained in 2019. Citing several geopolitical events taking place in recent months in the Persian Gulf and Middle East, EIA analysts suggest the market has experienced upward pressure on crude oil prices since September, leading to a small uptick in commodity prices that has otherwise offset supply growth resulting from global liquid fuels inventories that grew by 130,000 barrels per day (b/d) since September.

Monthly average Brent prices rose from \$63/b in September to \$67/b in December, notes the EIA, with the price of Brent crude oil temporarily reaching \$70/b in early January after the U.S. pursued military action in Iraq, increasing uncertainty about potential disruptions to oil production and shipping in the Middle East. Oil prices have subsequently subdued and fallen back closer to the \$60/b mark. "EIA expects that crude oil prices will remain elevated in the first few months of 2020, reflecting a price premium on crude oil from recent geopolitical events. However, this price premium will diminish in the first half of 2020, and market fundamentals will drive the crude oil price forecast in the second half of 2020 and in 2021," said experts.

As part of its recent outlook, the EIA also indicates the West Texas Intermediate (WTI) spot price will average \$59/b this year and increase to \$62/b in 2021.

Meanwhile, EIA forecasts Henry Hub natural gas spot prices will average \$2.33 per million British thermal units (MMBtu) in 2020, down from \$2.57/MMBtu in 2019. EIA said it also expects that natural gas prices to increase in 2021, reaching an annual average of \$2.54/MMBtu.

U.S. SENATE SIGNS OFF ON REVAMPED USMCA TRADE DEAL

In a move celebrated by the U.S. oil and gas industry, business owners and officials alike, Congress gave final bipartisan approval of the United States-Mexico-Canada-Agreement (USMCA) on January 16, sending the revamped trade deal to the president's desk for signature. With a vote of 89-10, the U.S. Senate in January formally passed legislation that adopts the North American trade package, which will replace the North American Free Trade Agreement, commonly referred to as NAFTA. The U.S. House of Representatives already voted in December to pass the USMCA, after lawmakers, administration officials and trade negotiators were finally able to reach a resolution allowing the U.S. government to proceed with ratification of the international trade agreement. Texas in particular stands to benefit from the passage of this new trade arrangement, which has been vital to the Texas economy and energy trade with Mexico and Canada. The president is expected to sign the USMCA into effect in a matter of days.
